Exposure to violence has been shown to increase a person's risk of adopting violent behaviors themselves.



Public health methods have been extremely successful in reducing violence in communities around the world.

Cure Violence Model

Detect and interrupt potentially violent conflicts

- Prevent retaliations
- Mediate ongoing conflicts
- Keep conflicts 'cool'

Identify and treat highest risk

- Access highest risk individuals
- Change behaviors
- Help obtain needed social services

Mobilize the community to change norms

- Respond to every shooting
- Spread positive norms

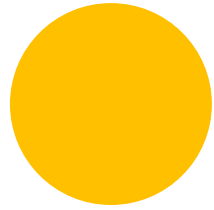

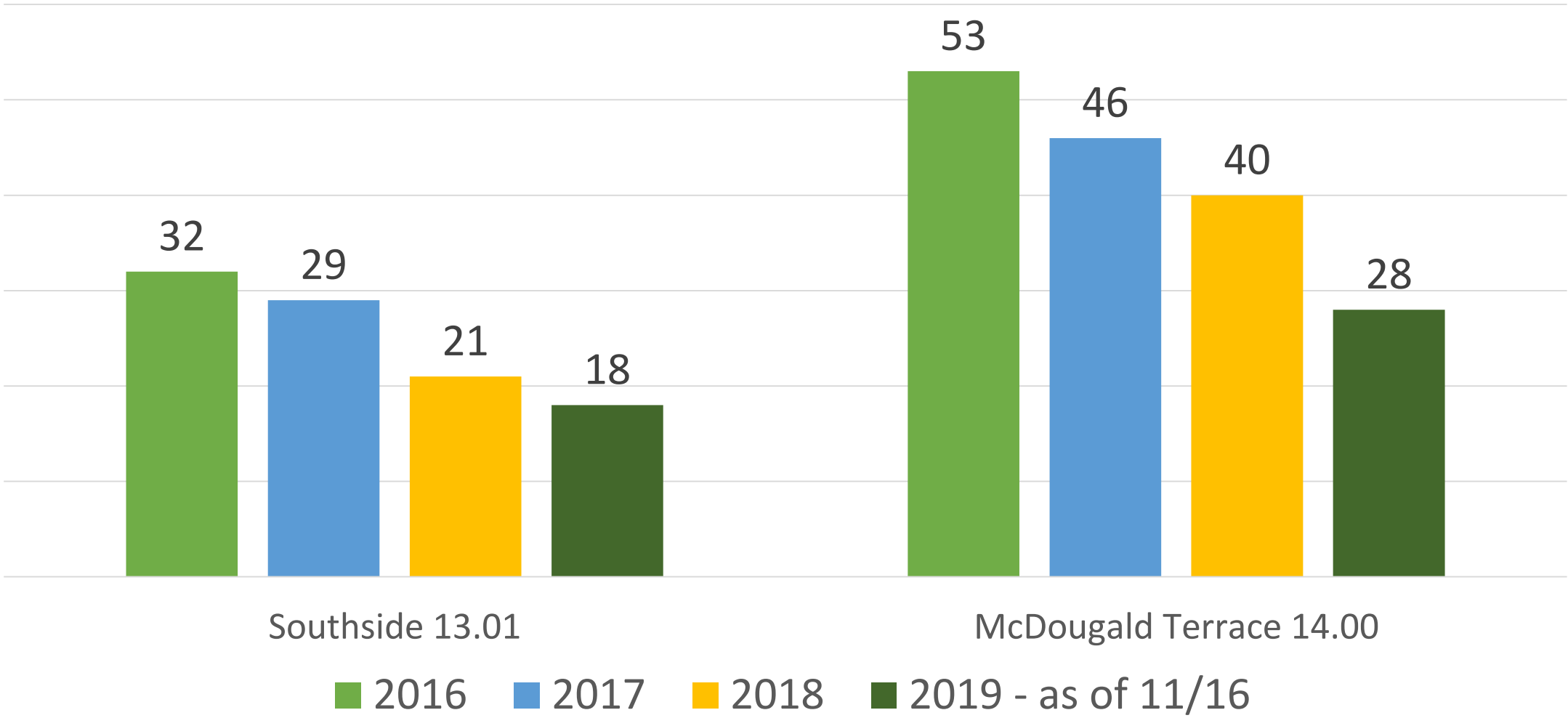

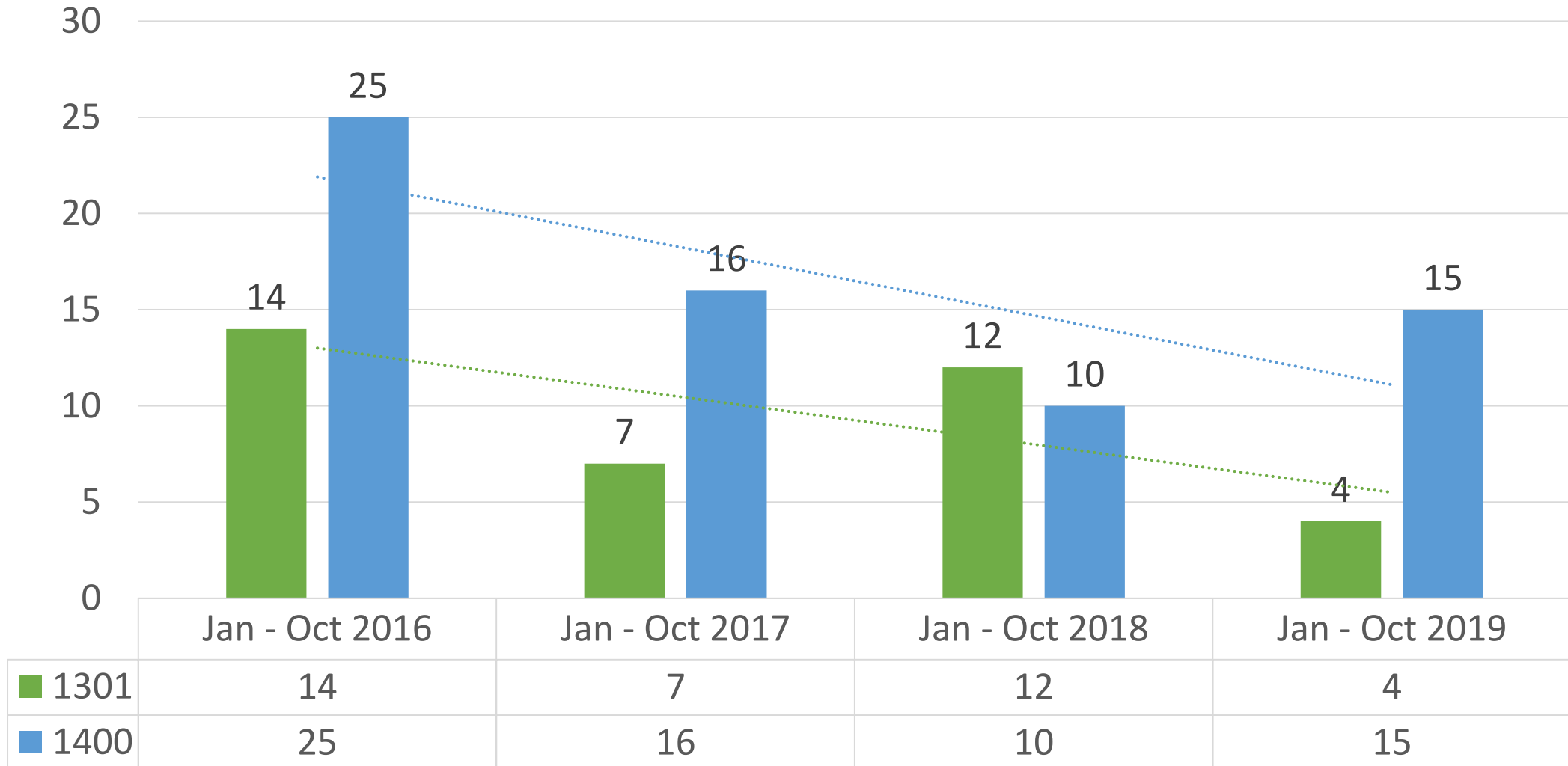

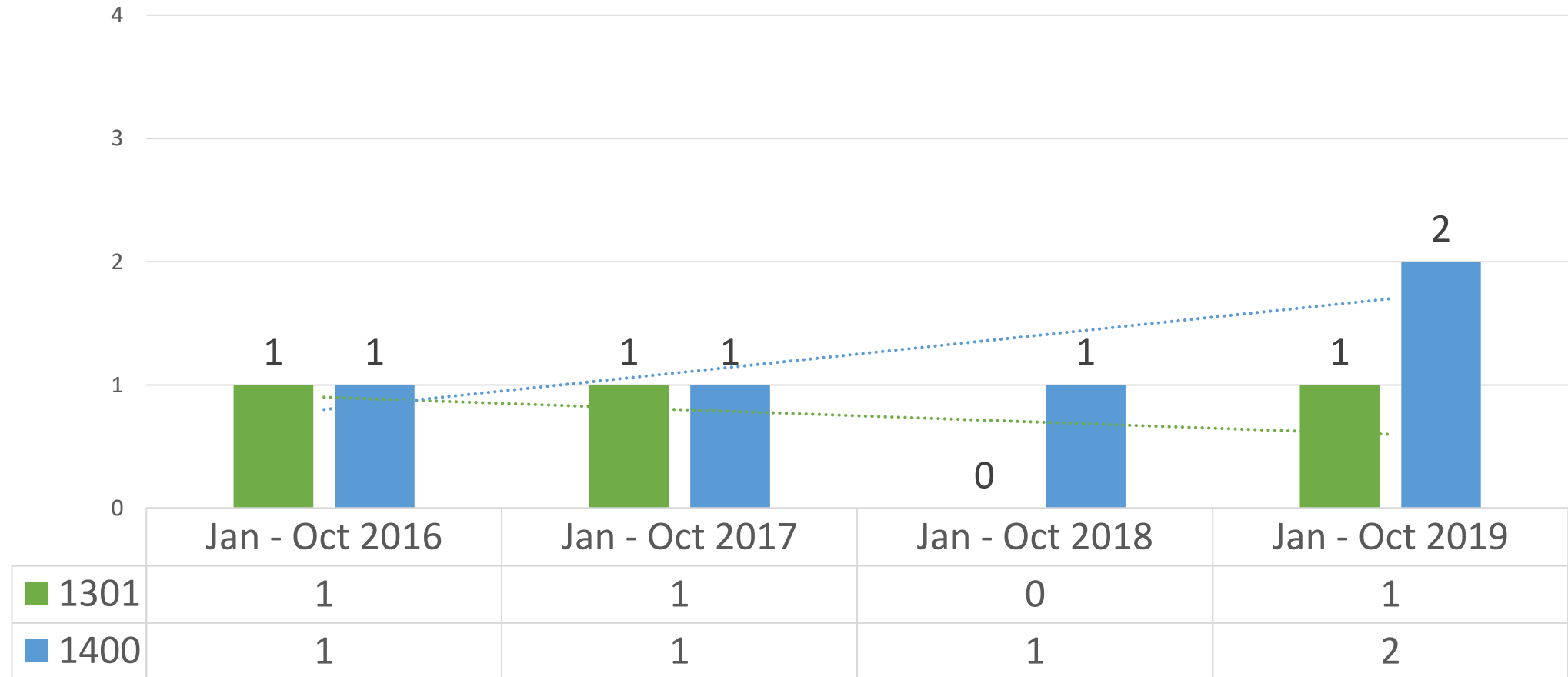
Shooting Incidents in Target Areas



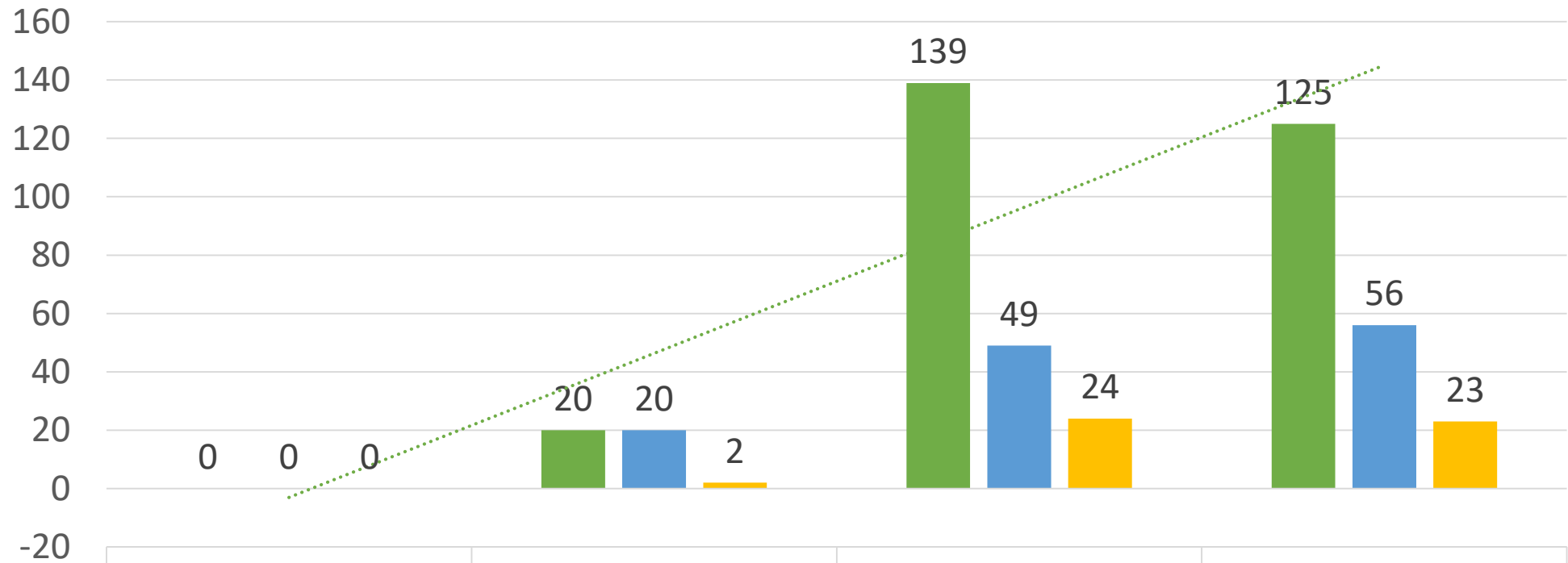
Persons Shot (BCU areas), Jan to Oct by year



Homicides (BCU areas), Jan to Oct by year

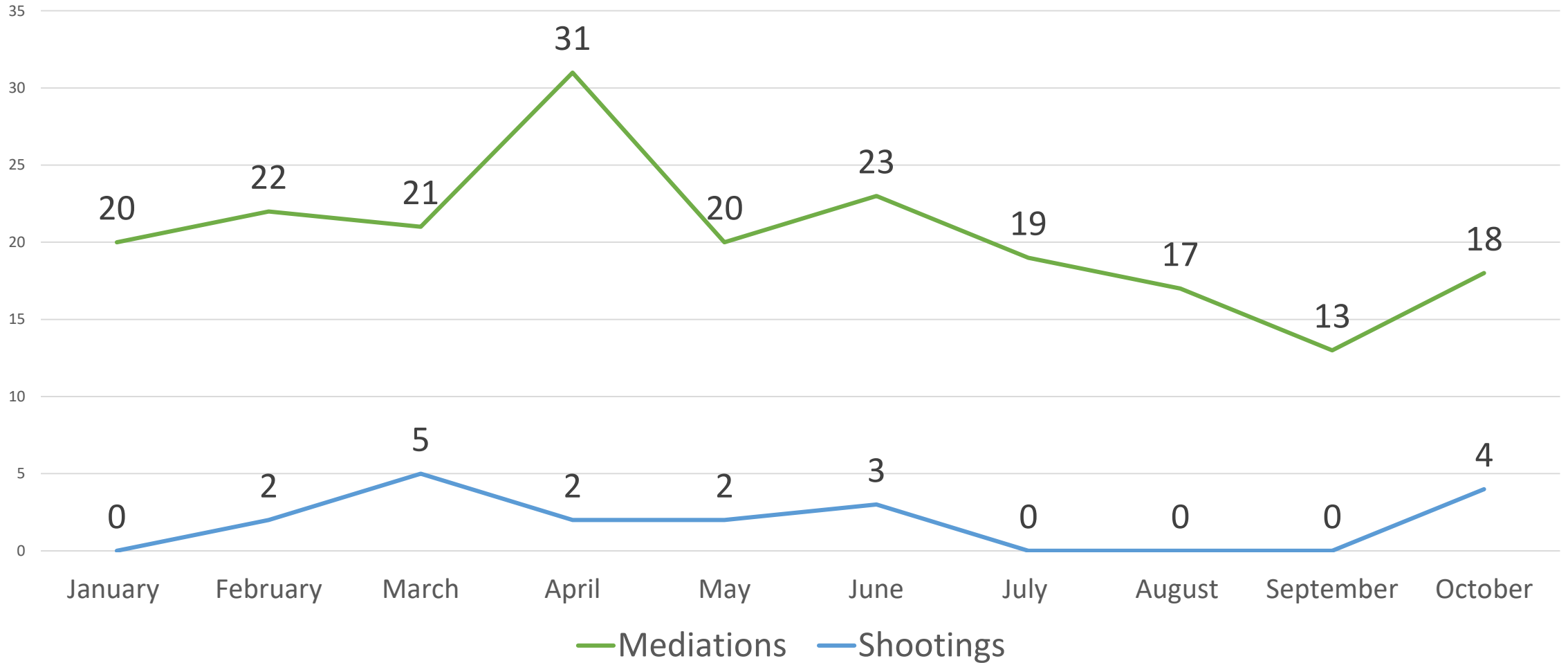


Mediations, Jan to Oct by Year



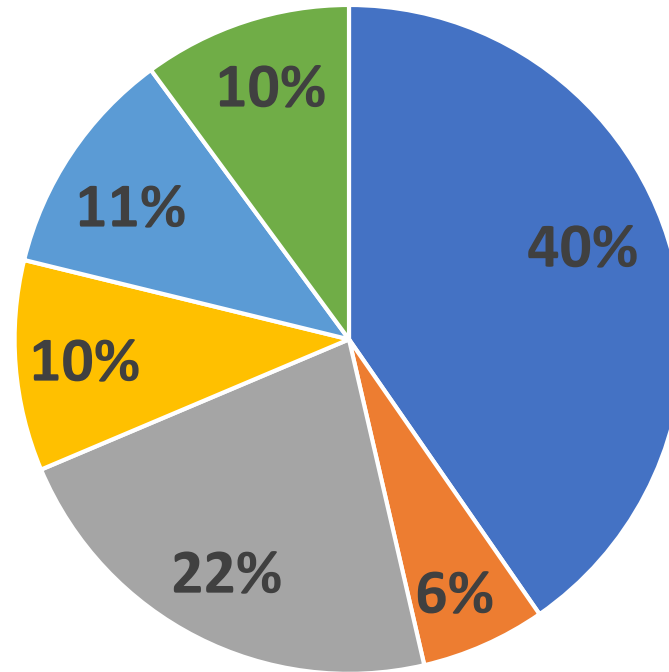

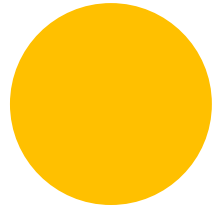
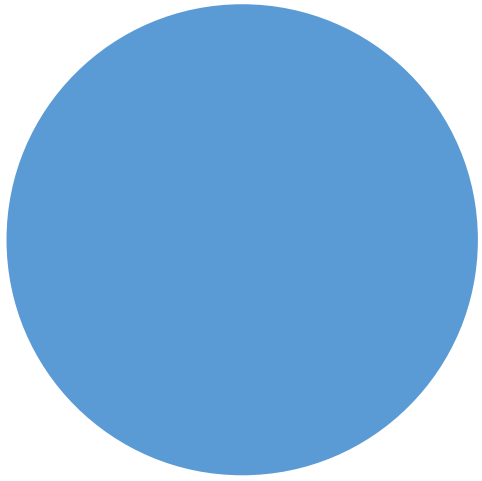


Primary Reason for Mediation

Grant Outcomes

We received a grant for BCU implementation that supported our efforts from October 1, 2016 to September 30, 2019

We started collecting data for the period of July 1, 2017 – December 31, 2017 and collected data for each 6 month period that followed with the exception of the last period that was from July 1, 2019 to September 30, 2019 and only spanned a 3 month time period.

Participant Outcomes



Served 85 unique participants that were placed on the caseload of an Outreach worker



81% of participants had one or fewer arrests from July 1, 2017 to September 30, 2019

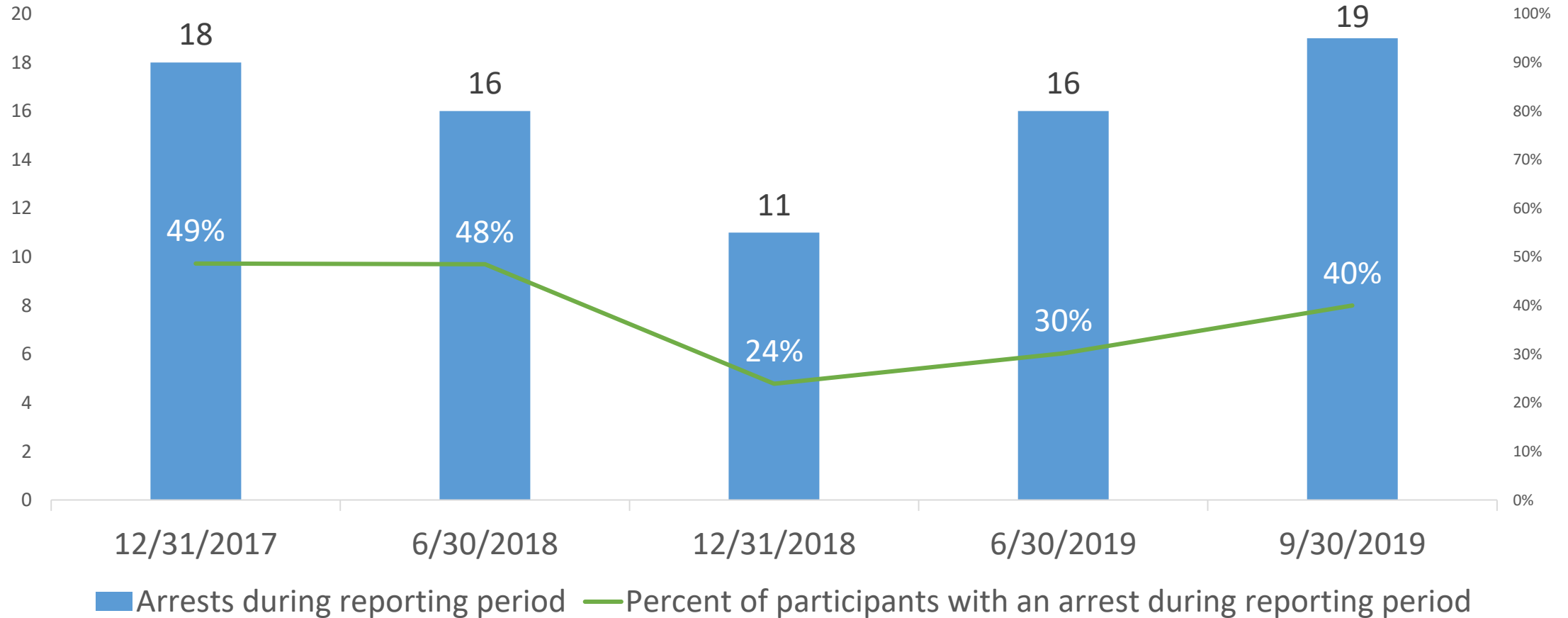


93% of participants received services to become employed

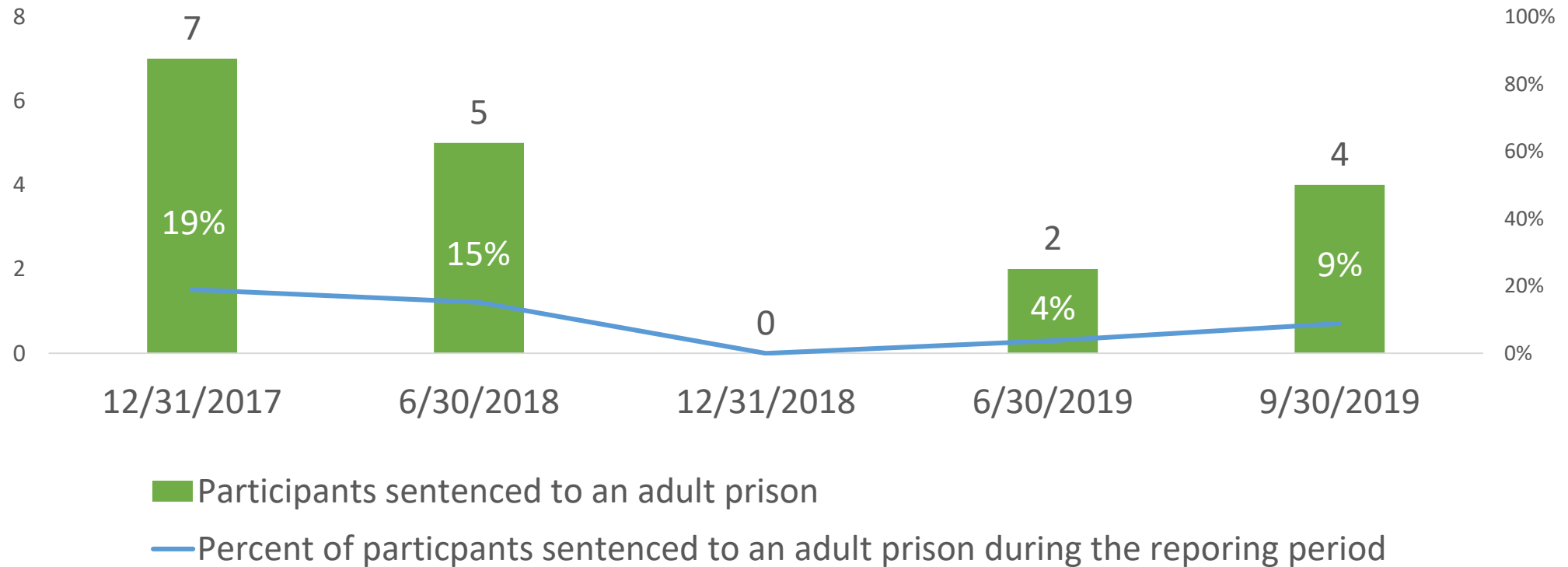


During each reporting period, at least 50% of participants were employed (highest was 85% during one period)

The proportion of participants who were arrested decreased



The proportion of participants sentenced to adult prison decreased



The proportion of participants with a violent gun offense decreased
