Durham County Government Funding Children and Youth Investments

- Durham County has established children and youth development as its primary governmental priority, allocating \$276.2 million, representing 40.0% of the FY 2025-26 General Fund budget, to youth-focused programs and services. This substantial investment demonstrates a sustained commitment to nurturing, educating, and protecting young residents across multiple service areas.
- Education represents the largest single investment within Durham County's children and youth portfolio. Durham Public Schools receives \$224.5 million for annual operations, while education-related capital debt service accounts for an additional \$61.8 million, creating a combined education investment of \$286.3 million.

ARPA Investments in Durham County Children and Youth

- To date, Durham County has invested \$16,441,731 of its America Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)
 Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (SLFRF) allocation in grants, contracts,
 and interlocal agreements aimed at supporting various needs of children and youth in
 Durham County. ARPA funding must be expended by December 31, 2026.
- Durham County has also utilized \$1,181,908 of interest income earned from the County's SLFRF advance payments from the U.S. Treasury Department to support additional grants for youth services in Durham County.
- These funds support investments in several key areas, including:
 - School capital investments with DPS (\$6,000,000)
 - Childcare and wraparound services subsidies with Early Years (\$2,400,000)
 - Student health support through school nurse positions (\$1,226,731)
 - Direct academic services and career preparation activities (\$5,100,000)
 - Enrichment activities, both school year and summer programming (\$2,171,908)
 - Mental health services for children and youth (\$830,000)



ARPA Investments in Academic Support and Career Preparation

- ARPA funding and ARPA interest income funding has been used to support five initiatives focused on providing direct instructional support, supplementary instructional services, workforce development programming, and career counseling services.
- A total of \$5,100,000 was allocated for these services, including through the following initiatives:
 - Made in Durham BULLS Life Science Academy (\$3,000,000) –
 Workforce development program helping youth earn BioWork certifications for careers in Biopharma manufacturing.
 - Support for Title I Schools ILA with DPS (\$1,400,000) Funding to support instructional expenditures at Title I schools in Durham County.
 - Emily K Center (\$100,000) Program connecting students with postsecondary opportunities and helping to plan and prepare for postsecondary success.



ARPA Investments in Children and Youth Enrichment Activities

- Durham County allocated \$2,171,908 from its ARPA SLFRF allocation and ARPA interest income to support 17 individual grant programs providing enrichment across a broad range of subject matters, including STEM, music, dance, sports and physical activity, and mentoring services.
- Grants were made for programs that provided both academic year and summer break enrichment activities, to ensure youth had continuous support and engagement throughout the calendar year.
- Examples of grants include:
 - St. Joseph's Historical Society (\$200,000) Youth arts enrichment program.
 - SwingPals (\$200,000) After-school golf education program.
 - Eno River Association (\$125,000) Nature-based school year and summer programming.
 - NC Arts in Action (\$165,000) Dance, music, and performance program for DPS students.



ARPA Investments in Children and Youth Mental Health Services

- Durham County allocated \$830,000 from its ARPA SLFRF allocation and ARPA interest income to support 5 individual grant programs focused on providing mental health services for Durham youth.
- While these grants were spurred by the mental health impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, the services have provided broader mental health supports for youth served by the programs.
- Programs include:
 - **El Futuro LAYA Program (\$200,000)** Specialized mental health support services for Latino youth.
 - Center for Homeownership and Economic Development Project TRIUMPH (\$150,000) Support for youth mental health services (ages 13-24).
 - Durham Public Schools Foundation Mental Health Ambassadors Program (\$350,000) Ongoing community mental health education for DPS students.
 - Youth Mentoring Collaborative (\$100,000) Healing-centered mentoring services for youth receiving mental health support.
