### Hayti Reborn-Justice Movement Grants awarded to HR-JM in 2023-2024

· Durham County awarded 2 million to Hayti Reborn Justice Movement to assist HR-JM with funding to support operations, which include stipends for participants who are enrolled in the BRIDGE program, apprenticeships, books, transportation, and emergency housing assistance.

• The Manpower Development Corporation, (MDC), grant in conjunction with Durham Technical Community College, awarded \$100,000 to Hayti Reborn Justice Movement to improve and upgrade the agency's technology.

• The Congressional grant awarded \$700,000 to Hayti Reborn Justice Movement to assist HR-JM with funding revenue to support daily operations.

• The City of Durham awarded \$50,000 to Hayti Reborn Justice Movement to assist HR-JM with funding revenue to support the daily operations.

### Perspective Grants for 07/01/2024 - 06/30/2025

· Dept. of Labor Employment & Training Administration grant, sponsored by Believers United for Progress (BUFP) in collaboration with Hayti Reborn-Justice Movement and the Sheriff's Department. Amount requested is \$500,00 The targeted population will be selected and referred to HRJM from pre-trial, diversion program and low crime rate individuals with misdemeanors. The Sheriff Dept. liaison will submit the names of the potential participants who are incarcerated for 3 months, 4 months and up to 6 months to HRJM, who will collaborate with BUFP and the Sheriff Dept. HRJM will arrange, coordinate and link Psycho-Social, Clinical Assessments, for a total of fifty formerly incarcerated participants in the age group 18-24 years of age. for the initial participants who are in the pre-trial program and whose anticipated release date is within the next 90 days. Care Managers will work closely with the participants and provide the necessary information to link them with job training/employment, apprenticeship opportunities, housing and other wellness initiatives.

· North Carolina Central University, Targeted Violence & Terrorism Prevention (TVTP) grant in collaboration with Hayti Reborn Justice Movement/Durham and the cities of Henderson and Princeville, NC.

The TVTP grant would aid the Durham, Henderson and Princeville, NC communities, as well as decrease crime in the city of Durham. This grant will target the age group of 13 – 18 years of age, as well as address the urgent matter of targeted youth violence in the city of Durham. It is appropriate that each of the three participating cities are referred to as "Learning Centers," which is important to ensure a sustainable and effective framework for action. Three critical TVTP goals are:

- · To implement prevention capabilities in small and mid-sized communities.
- · Advance equity in awards and engaging underserved communities in prevention.
  - · Enhancing local threat assessment and management capabilities.


### **Upcoming Fundraising Event 2024**




Bull City Bulldogs Athletic Association (BCAA): Led by Fred Evans, BCAA uses athletics and community engagement to develop well-rounded youth (ages 6-14) in basketball, football, and cheerleading. Support from HR-JM (\$15,970) helped them expand their capacity to serve 100 additional youth across football, cheerleading, and a new fall/winter basketball program





• 4 Quarters Basketball and Life Skills Camp: Founded by Kendrick Dowdy, this program uses basketball to instill leadership, respect, and perseverance in young men. Our sponsorship (\$1,500) included daily transportation for 15 youths and facilitated mental health workshops focusing on stress management, emotional regulation, and communication.







SideKicks Academy: Founded by Freddie McNeil, SideKicks uses Taekwondo to empower youth (6 – 10 yrs old) with leadership skills. An HR-JM grant of \$25,000 supported their summer leadership camp, serving 60 students from R.N. Harris, Burton Elementary, and surrounding communities.
