Our work focuses on connecting communities with the tools, support, and opportunities they need to create a more just, resilient, and equitable environment. We make volunteering accessible for everyone—youth, seniors, families, and coworkers alike—so all residents can take part in shaping their outdoor spaces. Our projects create visible, long-lasting improvements.

Our Vision for Durham

At Keep Durham Beautiful, our vision is that everyone in Durham has access to clean, green and beautiful outdoor spaces. That's why we listen and take action every day to learn about our community's environmental needs. While it is daunting to try to solve the issues challenging our environment alone, Keep Durham Beautiful is here to make it easier. Together we can lay the foundation for a resilient community.

An affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, Keep Durham Beautiful is a 501c3 nonprofit. We work in partnership with the City of Durham and Durham County to help residents take action through volunteer opportunities, tool lending, educational programs, and resource coordination. Our environmental stewardship activities focus on litter prevention and community greening where they are most needed.

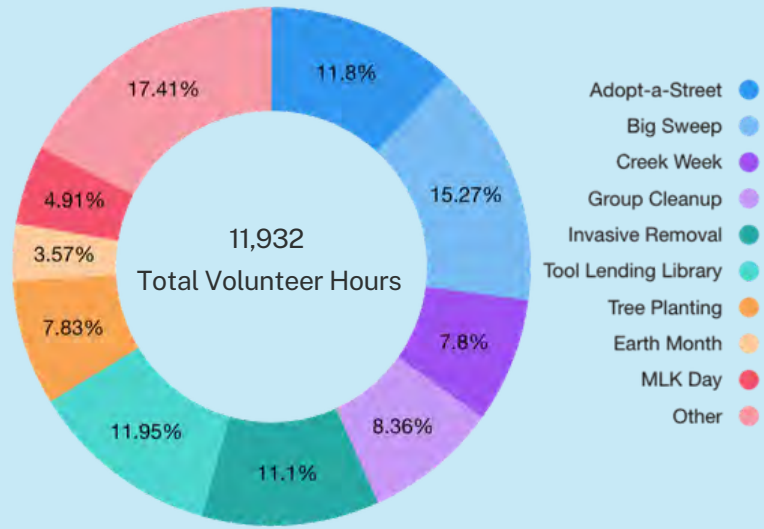

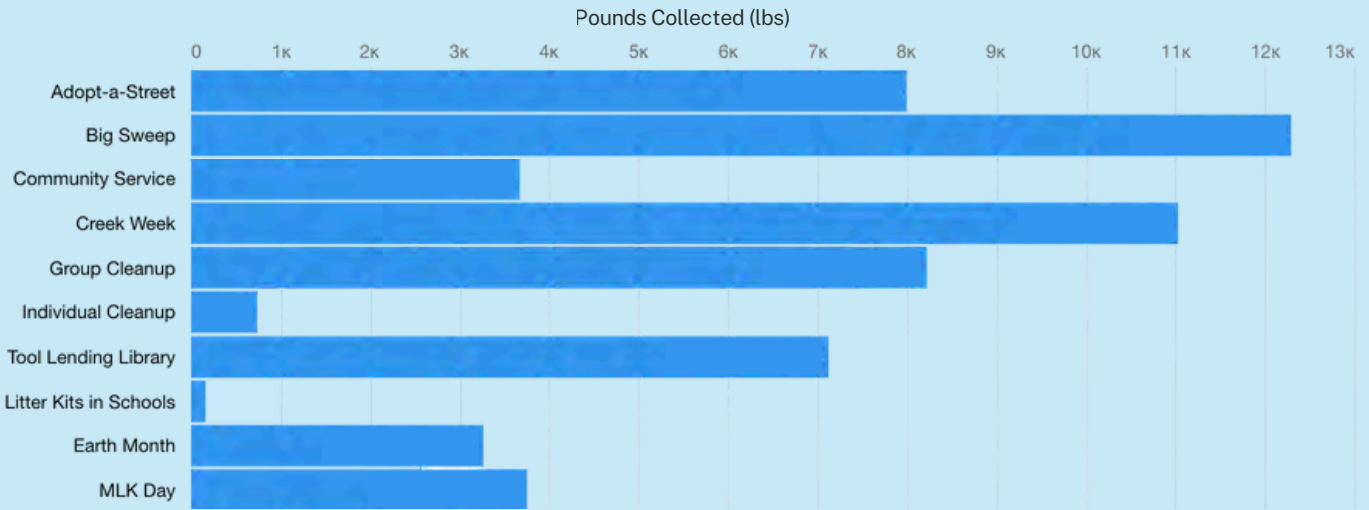

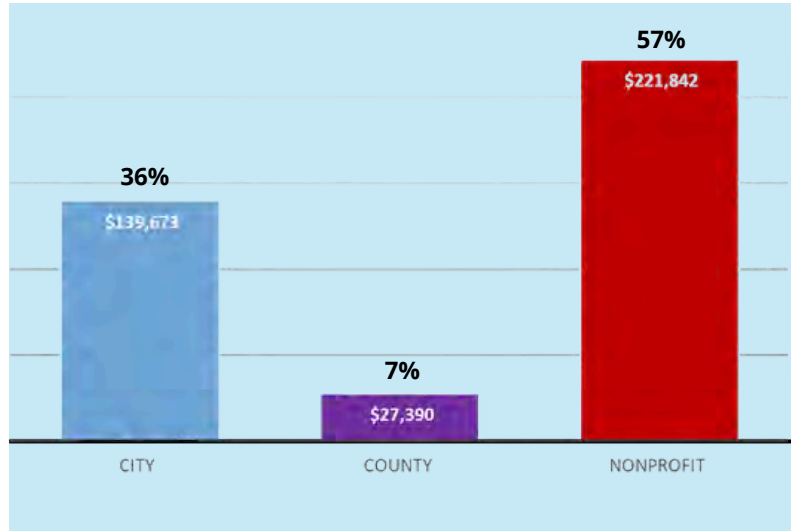

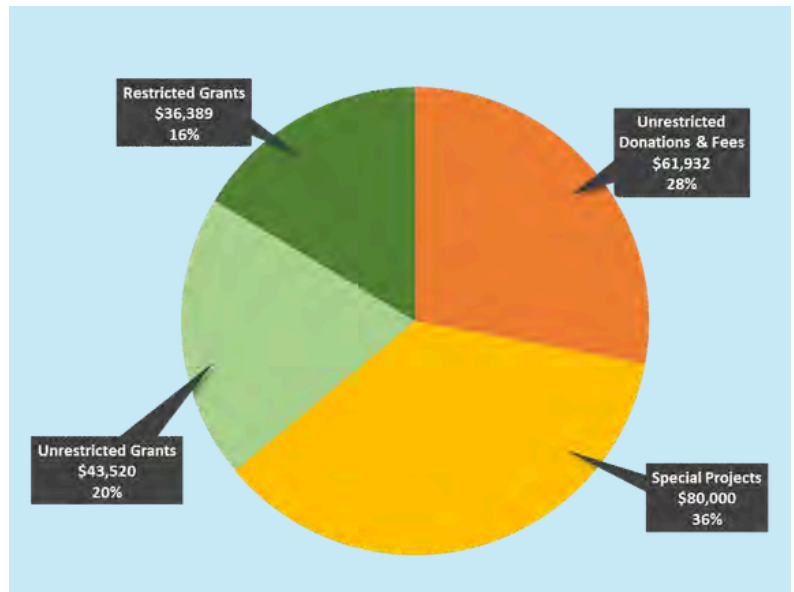

Litter harms our communities. It devalues neighborhoods, threatens wildlife, and reduces water quality impacting the health of our residents. We connect residents with resources and other volunteers to build an engaged and active community dedicated to litter prevention in Durham.

At KDB, we organize community litter removal events on roadsides and waterways and focus on preventing litter, stopping it at the source. This means collaborating with local businesses, other nonprofit organizations, and City and County initiatives. We emphasize education to engage youth as part of the solution. All neighborhoods and communities in Durham deserve to be beautiful, litter-free, and healthy.

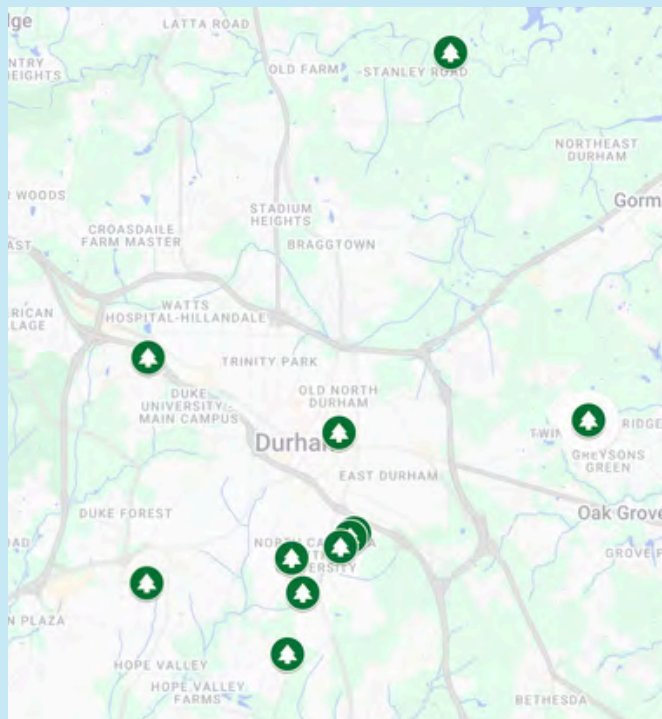
Community Greening & Sustainable Landscapes

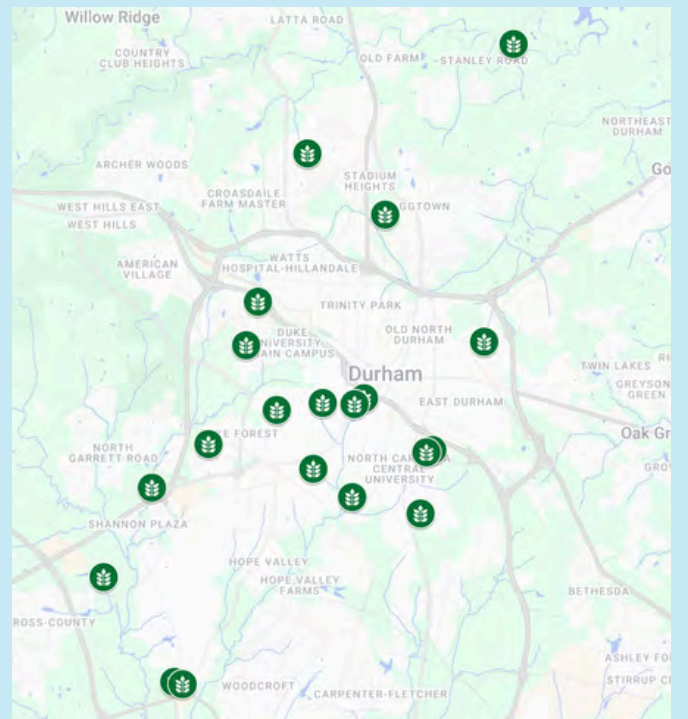

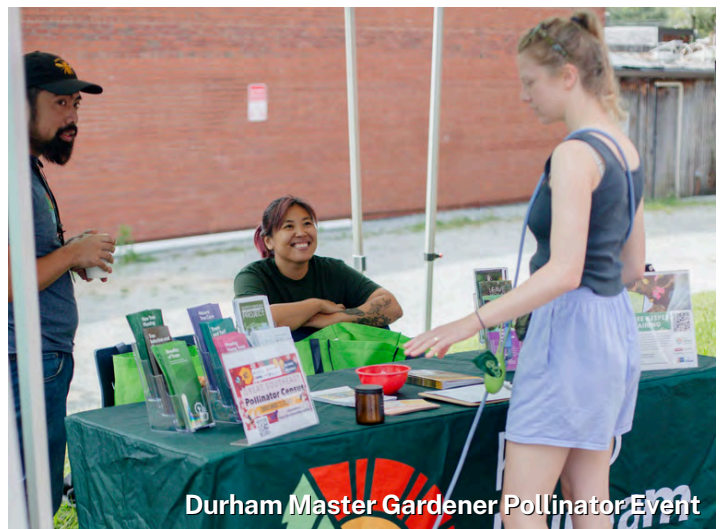

Durham Bee City Committee

Bee Day

Durham has been recognized as a Bee City USA since 2016. In June, KDB cohosted the fourth annual Durham Bee Day Festival in celebration of National Pollinator Week. Over 300 people attended to help protect pollinators, sample honey, observe bee hives, and join a parade.

This was the largest Bee Day celebration yet, featuring 14 organizations that joined to share information, crafts, demonstrations, and more. At Bee Day, KDB distributed 110 pollinator plants grown by Annabel Renwick at Duke Gardens.

Chatham Mills Pollinator Garden

In August, 9 members of the City of Durham landscaping team and 8 members of the Durham Bee City Committee toured Debbie Roos' Pollinator Paradise Garden in Pittsboro. Visitors were able to learn about the garden and pollinator planting practices to bring back to Durham.

The garden features over 225 species of perennials, trees, shrubs, vines, and grasses, 85% of which are native to North Carolina.

Durham Environmental Coalition

KDB helps host and co-lead the Durham Environmental Coalition (DEC). A collaboration of 33 diverse organizations, the DEC envisions an equitable environmental movement that values biodiversity, sustainability, and inclusive decision-making. At its core, the DEC addresses critical issues in the environmental sector, including the underrepresentation of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) in environmental initiatives. The coalition actively works to amplify BIPOC voices and organizations, fostering a more inclusive and representative environmental movement.

In 2025, the DEC hosted a series of impactful monthly meetings including presentations by City-County Planning on the new Unified Development Ordinance, New Hope Bird Alliance, Durham Hub Farm, the Master Naturalist Program, Merrick-Moore Community Development Corporation, Project Pando by Leaf & Limb, and KDB on upcoming Durham Urban Forestry Plantings.

Beaver Queen Pageant

This year, KDB was honored to be the fundraising recipient of the 2025 Beaver Queen Pageant. The pageant raised \$9,000 for KDB to continue supporting our programming going toward our mission and vision for Durham. The first Beaver Queen Pageant in 2005 was a celebration of a successful campaign to protect a tract of wetland in Durham that serves as a beaver habitat. Now, the pageant serves as a unique Durham event and fundraiser.

For the second year in a row, KDB participated in the Durham Pride Parade celebrating pride and picking up litter along the parade route. We were joined by 17 volunteers from KDB and NC Peace Corps and removed 66 pounds of trash along the way!

Education

Litter Prevention Public Art

In partnership with the City of Durham Cultural and Public Art Program, KDB received a \$10,000 grant from South Arts to promote litter prevention through a creative public art installation at a bus stop shelter and an interior mural at Southern High School. The mural is nearing completion by the students and regional artist Mayanthy Jayawardena.

As an additional part of the mural project, we expanded our Litter Kits in Schools curriculum to include art-focused litter prevention classroom projects and exercises including a classroom sculpture activity, recycling bag decoration, and a litter free mural project. This curriculum accompanies a complete litter kit for schools to engage with litter prevention for K-12 students.

Invasive Plant Removal Workshop

On May 1st, 24 attendees joined us at Campus Hills Park for our first Invasive Plant Removal Workshop in partnership with New Hope Bird Alliance and ReWild Earth. This workshop served as an educational component alongside our monthly invasive plant removal workdays at Durham parks held throughout the year.

This workshop included a presentation on the importance of removing invasive plants, best practices, and tool use training. We practiced different techniques in an outdoors, hands-on portion.

Other Educational Initiatives

Litter Leader Trainings

Over three sessions, we trained 39 new Litter Leaders in 2025. Litter Leaders are volunteers dedicated to litter prevention in Durham. After receiving training on best practices for leading litter cleanups, volunteers can then organize and lead their own cleanups for the community.

Tree Keeper Training

Each year, along with the City of Durham and the Durham County Cooperative Extension, KDB hosts a Tree Keeper Training Series. In 2025, 28 participants were trained in tree planting, pruning, and tree care. After completing training, Tree Keepers lead small groups of volunteers, provide quality control, and teach others how to plant and care for trees.

Leave Your Leaves Forum

In August, ahead of autumn, we hosted a Leave Your Leaves information session with New Hope Bird Alliance (NHBA) at the Durham County Library. Led by NHBA's Barbara Driscoll, 28 attendees learned how leaving your leaves in the fall to naturally decompose back into your garden benefits the birds and insects, prevents climate change, reduces flooding, and saves time and money.

Controlling Invasive Plants Manual

With the help of New Hope Bird Alliance, KDB assisted with the creation of the NC Botanical Garden's Fourth Edition of their Controlling Invasive Plants Manual. The Manual introduces invasive plants, outlines possible treatment methods, and highlights many of the most common invasive species that are found in North Carolina.

Adopt-a-Street • Safer Streets

Some of our most dedicated and regular volunteers, Adopt-a-Street groups select a mile-long stretch of city-maintained street(s) and commit to removing litter along that distance once a month. This year, our 35 Adopt-a-Street groups spent 1,376 hours removing 7,976 pounds of litter from their adopted streets.

Adopt-a-Highway • Cleaner Community

In February 2024, KDB adopted a 2-mile stretch of highway along East Geer Street and Cheek Road as part of the NCDOT's Adopt-a-Highway program. KDB hosts regular volunteer cleanup events along our adopted stretch.

Big Sweep • Greatest Impact

Every October, KDB organizes Durham's largest litter cleanup effort of the year. Groups from across the community lead cleanups throughout the month all across Durham. This year, there were 54 Big Sweep cleanups with 1,059 volunteers pitching in. This marks the largest volunteer turnout and most number of events since Big Sweep began in 2005. Across 2,285 hours, volunteers collected and removed 13,448 pounds of litter from local roadways, parks, neighborhoods, and waterways.

Creek Week • Clean Water & Education

The third week in March each year, KDB celebrates Creek Week. In partnership with the City of Durham Department of Environmental and Street Services Stormwater Division, we hosted the 17th annual week-long initiative dedicated to celebrating, protecting, and discovering Durham's local waterways.

This year, 577 volunteers removed 15,048 pounds of trash from 41 different sites across Durham! In addition to litter cleanups, this year's Creek Week included paddle tours, water-based trivia, critter observations, citizen science projects, frog watch, a stormwater talk, tree identification walks, and more. These events were made possible thanks to our many partners all across Durham!

Bike Lane & Bus Stop Cleanups • Safe & Equitable Transportation

In collaboration with Bike Durham, we led two cleanups of the bike lanes and bus stop on North Miami Boulevard and Raynor Street. Across the two cleanups, 28 volunteers removed over 200 pounds of trash and several hundred pounds of plant debris.

Greatest American Cleanup • Nationwide Partnership

Joining Keep America Beautiful affiliates across the nation, Keep Durham Beautiful hosted two litter cleanups this fall as part of the Greatest American Cleanup. The goal of these cleanups is to remove 25 billion pieces of trash nation-wide by July 4th, 2026. In our first two cleanups for this event, 37 volunteers helped remove 758 pounds of litter from the area around E. Geer Street, Cheek Road, and North Miami Boulevard. KDB plans to continue this initiative in 2026 with two more planned cleanups.

Community Greening

Tree Plantings

This year, we planted 261 trees across Durham to improve the urban tree canopy with an emphasis on native trees and locations with lower tree canopy cover. Our tree plantings would not be possible without the support of our Tree Keepers, volunteers trained in tree planting and care.

Sandy Creek Park Beautification Project

On March, 1st, KDB was joined by 41 employees, members and friends of State Employees Credit Union. These volunteers helped with a comprehensive beautification project at Sandy Creek Park hosted in partnership with Keep North Carolina Beautiful.

This project included weeding and raking garden beds, planting 350 flower bulbs, removing invasive plants, and refreshing gravel trails at Sandy Creek Park.

Tree & Bulb Giveaways

Throughout the year, KDB hosts tree, plant, and seed giveaway events. These events encourage planting native species and expand the urban tree canopy with the help of community members in both public and private spaces. Across these events, KDB gave away 748 trees and 24,622 bulbs for planting all around Durham.

These giveaways are made possible through our partnerships with City of Durham Urban Forestry Division, Panther Creek Forest Farm, Durham Tree Keepers, and the many community organizations that helped connect residents with the events.

Growing the Urban Forest

KDB will be leading the community engagement for the City of Durham's plan for planting 8,500 trees in the next three years. In addition to the planting, the City is also conducting a city-wide canopy study and an inventory of all city trees. Together, the canopy and inventory assessments will measure current tree coverage within Durham's urban growth boundary, help us understand the health of our current canopy, and lead to identification of new suitable planting areas.

KDB is reaching out to communities in designated planting areas to spread awareness of the process and information about the benefits of urban trees. In tandem with the city planting efforts, KDB is hosting educational workshops, volunteer plantings, and tree giveaway events.

In 2025, we...

- Attended **16** community events to share about the Urban Forestry program
- Trained **26** new Tree Keeper Volunteers
- Canvassed for homes adjacent to **722** planting sites, **403** of which were planted this year



Sustainable Landscapes

Durham Garden Tour

On April 26th and 27th, KDB hosted the second annual Durham Garden Tour. The tour featured ten distinctive gardens highlighting examples of sustainable and creative design here in our very own community.

Each garden provided unique insights into sustainable and innovative landscaping and gardening practices like native planting, water features, xeriscaping, edible planting, and more. Attendees are able to explore the gardens, meet garden owners, and converse with other tour goers.

With 460 garden visitors supported by 77 volunteers, the tour raised \$23,000 that will go toward Keep Durham Beautiful's programming and mission.

Invasive Plant Removal

This year, KDB hosted rotating monthly invasive species removal workdays in Durham Parks in collaboration with Durham Parks and Rec, Rewild Earth, and New Hope Bird Alliance. The events were led by volunteers Julie d'Ablain, Peter Schubert, Megan Brame, and Steven Feuerstein.

Panther Creek Forest Farm Partnership

This year, we've worked in partnership with Panther Creek Forest Farm to expand access to trees for Durham residents. KDB's office serves as a site for seed collection. Donated seeds go to Panther Creek Forest Farm where KDB helps provide volunteers for seed planting and care. Finally, when the trees are mature enough for planting, we help to distribute these trees to Durham residents throughout the community via tree giveaways at no cost to residents.

The Big Dig

At the beginning of November, we joined Panther Creek Forest Farm for the Big Dig. For this annual, large-scale workday, 45 volunteers came to the community forest farm to pitch in. Volunteers potted 500+ tree seedlings, gave away 20 trees to the community, and processed black walnut seeds to be easily planted. These seedlings will grow into saplings over the next few years and will eventually be given away to Durham community members.

Volunteer Highlights

Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service

In celebration of Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service, KDB hosted four litter cleanups at Merrick Moore Garden, E. Geer Street and Cheek Road, Southside, and Walltown. We were joined by 185 volunteers who removed 3,754 pounds of litter across Durham in one day.

In addition to these four events, KDB partnered with Litter Leaders, community members, and organizations to hold seven other cleanup events over MLK Day weekend.

9/11 Day of Service

In honor and remembrance of 9/11, KDB hosted two litter cleanups on Hoover Road and in East Durham. We were joined by 40 volunteers who removed an estimated 1,224 pounds of trash.

Earth Month

In celebration of Earth Month, KDB hosted a variety of events including 11 litter cleanups with 194 volunteers. Green Team volunteers at the Full Frame Film Festival used our Clearstream Recycling Bins to help festival goers responsibly sort their trash at the event. Additionally, at the Earth Day Festival, KDB gave away 395 native pollinator plants from Mellow Marsh Farm.
