



Notable Timeline for Alliance

| July 1, 2012 | Alliance Behavioral Healthcare began operating as a Local Management Entity/Managed Care Organization (LME/MCO) after the merger between The Durham Center and Wake County. The focus at the time was covering behavioral health services for individuals covered by the LME/MCO. |

| January 15, 2019 | Alliance Behavioral Healthcare became Alliance Health in preparation for the launch of the BH I/DD Tailored Plan, an integrated managed care health plan providing physical health, behavioral health, long-term services and supports, and pharmacy benefits |
| July 1, 2024 | Alliance Health launched the Tailored Plan, a fully integrated health plan, covering BH, PH, pharmacy and SDOH for our members. Individuals in the Tailored Plan also receive Tailored Care Management support, which began in December 2023 |

Durham School-Based Team (SBT)


- Partnership between DPS and Alliance Health
 - Replicating two award winning programs based on Wake SBT model and PULSE: Prioritizing and Uplifting Learners through Social-Emotional Empowerment
- SBT goals
 - Link students to behavioral health services/supports as quickly as possible
 - Address unmet social care needs

Durham School-Based Team

- Key program components
 - Support for students transitioning in and out of psychiatric residential facilities
 - Crisis Navigation (known as SYNC)
 - Cases of concern for vulnerable students
 - Bridges to Care
- Exploring the addition of Virtual Teen Peer Support
 - Provides unlimited text and virtual peer support by Certified young adult Peer Support Specialists

Current Status of Partnership Progress

- MOA approved in both systems with Legal and Compliance
- All Durham positions posted, in process of hiring six positions:
 - 1 Supervisor
 - 1 Bilingual Care Coordinator
 - 3 Clinically Licensed Liaisons
 - 1 Long Term Services Liaison
- Launching program in Southwest Region, 12 schools as selected by DPS
- Plan is to have a soft launch beginning of school year



Durham Network Highlights

- Lincoln Community Health Center
 - Serves as the primary care provider for 1914 Alliance Tailored Plan members
 - Rebuilding onsite services at the Durham Recovery Response Center to support integrated care
- Supporting service expansion with El Futuro
 - Direct, culturally and linguistically competent treatment services and related expenses for un and under-insured adults, young adults and adolescents
 - Case management, wrap-around and community engagement

Durham Network Highlights

- Expansion of Strong Minds program through El Futuro serving Durham residents
 - Specially trained Community Health Workers provide community mental health interventions to Hispanic population

Durham Network Highlights

- Carolina Outreach awarded contract to provide Forensic Assertive Community Treatment Team services
 - Team-based care for individuals with serious mental illness, substance use disorders and risks factors for return to criminal type behaviors
 - Strong focus on employment, housing, behavioral health and medical care
 - Launching late fall 2025

Durham Recovery Response Center

- Accepts individuals on involuntary commitment, individuals dropped off by law enforcement and people walking in for care
- Provides crisis evaluations, behavioral health urgent care,
 23-hour observation and facility-based crisis beds
- Embedded benefits navigator to assist with Medicaid enrollment

Durham Recovery Response Center

 Provided a mix of behavioral health urgent care services to 1215 Alliance Medicaid members and uninsured residents in FY24 and facility-based crisis to 925 Alliance Medicaid and uninsured residents during this time

Threshold Psychosocial Rehabilitation

- Long standing Durham provider that serves individuals with serious and persistent mental illness
 - Extended member crisis support
 - Wrap-around and therapeutic support to program graduates and excluded services
 - Employment and job skill development
 - Administrative cost offset
