

# NC Opioid Settlement Strategies

In line with the National Settlement Agreement, funds "may support programs or services...that serve persons with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) or any co-occurring Substance Use Disorder (SUD) or mental health condition."


Exhibit A strategies are high-impact strategies to address the opioid overdose epidemic.

**Exhibit B strategies** are from the national settlement agreements. These strategies are available to local governments that have first engaged in the **Collaborative Strategic Planning process**. There are over 100 **Exhibit B strategies** that are grouped into 12 **Exhibit B categories**.

# **MOA Guiding Principles**

- 1. Spend the money to save lives
- 2. Use evidence and data to guide spending
- 3. Invest in prevention of root causes
- 4. Focus on equity and populations disproportionally impacted; Include people with lived experience
- 5. Transparency and Accountability
  - Fair and transparent process for deciding where and how to spend the funding

- 4. Two Community Paramedics added to the team


#### Collaborative Strategic Planning



- Shared Opioid Settlement 6 updates with key local stakeholders/committees.
- Developed Advisory Committee resolution and bylaws
- Engaged with Opioid Settlement
   Program Managers across North
   Carolina to share best practices, align
   on strategies, and strengthen statewide
   coordination.

#### Collaborative Strategic Planning

 Collaborated with Data Scientist John Paul Zitta to create a publicfacing data dashboard showcasing monthly progress.





#### **Naloxone Distribution**

- 3,300 naloxone kits distributed through:
  - Vending machines
  - Partner organizations
  - Direct outreach.
- 10 overdose response trainings delivered to 194 individuals. 97% of participants reported confidence in using naloxone after the training.



#### Sterile Syringe Distribution

- Mobile delivery and outreach efforts led to 40 new participants; a major increase compared to the dozen (12) regular walk-in users at the pharmacy.
- These mobile efforts
   resulted in more than double
   the distribution of sterile
   syringes compared to walk in volume alone.





#### **Recovery Support Services**

# **CLC Peer Support Specialists Impact:**

- 187 new participants served; 94 had opioid use issues.
- 75 participants enrolled in treatment; 38 of them for opioid use.
- 2,767 total contacts made; 402 free Uber rides provided.
- 100% satisfaction reported by surveyed participants.

#### Post Overdose Response Team

#### **Opioid Response Trends:**

- EMS is responding to ~60.6 opioid-related incidents per month in FY25, down from 74.8 in FY22.
- The decline is attributed to broader community efforts (naloxone access, stability post-COVID, education, etc.)






#### Post Overdose Response Team

#### **MOUD Program:**


- Began in May 2023 (FY24); in FY25, inducted 54 unique patients.11 patients received repeat care, 2 due to relapse, 9 due to issues accessing their prescriptions.
- Retention: ~65% at Lincoln Community Health Center;
   ~25% at Morse Clinic (preliminary data).





#### Post Overdose Response Team

Lincoln Community Health Center is our top referral partner (37%), with early data showing ~65% retention; other key partners include Durham Recovery Response Center, Morse Clinic (25% retention), and telehealth providers VBOT and Reliable Health.



# FY25-26 Recommended Budget Highlights

## FY 2025-26 Recommended Spending Plans

#### 1. Collaborative Strategic Planning:

• Funding increase from \$145,119 to \$158,015 to support advisory committee development, data transparency, and stakeholder coordination.

#### 2. Harm Reduction Expansion:

- Funding increase from \$274,252 to \$299,252
- Launching a contract position to expand outreach, training, and community distribution.
- Increase naloxone distribution through our existing 15 partner sites across high-overdose areas of Durham

#### 3. Recovery Support Services (CLC), Syringe Services, and PORT:

Other Strategies seeking level funding except OES with the addition of a Peer Support Specialist to strengthen participant engagement and care continuity.

# Additional Issues or Topics for Discussion

## **Current Challenges**

- 1. Phone Access: Seeking funding to launch a free phone program for CLC participants to stay connected to treatment and support services.
- 2. Peer Support Staffing: PSS roles are high-stress; staffing gaps may occur despite funding for 3 full-time positions.
- **3. Grant Risk:** Potential early loss of FR-CARA grant threatens key services, including naloxone, MOUD, fentanyl test strips, educational materials, and training (set to end Sept 29, 2026)
- **4. Sustainability Planning:** FY27 budget support may be needed to continue vital services if grant funding ends early.
