Key Dates – Recap

DECEMBER 31, 2024: Funds must be *incurred* and obligated

DECEMBER 31, 2026: Funds must be *expended* to cover obligations and all work must be completed

American Rescue Plan Act Funding Categories



Support Public Health Response

Fund COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff



Replace Public Sector Revenue Loss

Use funds to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic



Water and Sewer Infrastructure

Make necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water and invest in wastewater and stormwater infrastructure



Address Negative Economic Impacts

Respond to economic harms to workers, families, small businesses, impacted industries, and the public sector



Premium Pay for Essential Workers

Offer additional support to those who have and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical infrastructure sectors



Broadband Infrastructure

Make necessary investments to provide unserved or underserved locations with new or expanded broadband access

Guiding Principles Highlights Established in June 2021

- Prioritization given to funding projects that support the Board's strategic and capital plans and other assessments endorsed by the BOCC.
- Leverage ARPA funds from federal, state and local community to optimize overall allocation.
- Prioritization given to funding that addresses equity including health disparities, closing the
 achievement gap, infrastructure support to unincorporated areas and funding to support minorityowned businesses.
- Evaluate infrastructure needed to address compliance increased workloads resultant from COVID-19
 in the human services, public safety and administrative operations.
- Establish framework for community discussions and input. Coordinate discussions with community partners when possible. Communications should include accommodation for non-English speaking and hard of hearing residents if needed to the extent possible in these sessions.
- County expenses that can be reimbursed through FEMA should be limited on ARPA dollars.
- Identify strategic one-time projects and/or a sustainability strategy for initiatives that require funding beyond one year.
- Establish rubric to evaluate and rank projects to ensure optimal and highest use of funds are achieved

Durham County ARPA Community RFP's - \$10.4 Million

Capacity Building and Technical Assistance for Child Care - \$1.6 Million

The County anticipates awarding up to two (2) proposals with up to \$800,000 over two years.

Expanding Access to Affordable Child Care - \$2 Million

The County anticipates awarding one (1) proposal with up to \$2 million over two years.

• Improving Child and Family Social-Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) - Children Ages 0-12 \$1.5 Million

The County anticipates awarding proposals between \$50,000 and \$300,00 over two years.

Improving Youth and Family Social-Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) - Youth Ages 13-24 \$800,000

The County anticipates awarding proposals between \$50,000 and \$200,00 over two years.

Youth Enrichment and Recreational Activities - \$1.5 Million

The County anticipates awarding proposals between \$50,000 and \$250,00 over two years.

Capacity Building for Culturally-Affirming Maternal Health Support - \$1.5 Million

The County anticipates awarding proposals in the range of \$50,000-\$300,000 over two years.


Crime Intervention Initiatives - \$1.5 Million

The County anticipates awarding proposals between \$50,000 and \$250,00 over two years.



ARPA Proposals Evaluation Process

- Applications were reviewed by Durham County staff including internal and external subject matter experts. Five groups evaluated 75 nonprofit applications, totaling over \$20.2 million in ARPA funding requests.
- A scoring system considered the approaches on how funding would be used including, organizational capacity, project complexity, equity, fiscal management capacity and project sustainability beyond ARPA funding availability.
- Contracts will be developed to begin as early as January 2023, with an end date of with a December 31, 2024
- The County will bolster infrastructure to support nonprofit entities to help ensure successful project completion and adherence to fiscal controls and reporting requirements, including coordinating the use of fiscal agents.

Selected organizations will provide technical assistance and capacity building services to licensed childcare sites and informal childcare providers seeking licensure. The entities will assist childcare sites with strengthening their business practices and recovery from the financial losses of the pandemic, providing financial assistance to sites to help them purchase materials and support their staff, and/or providing support and training to informal childcare providers interested in establishing licensed family childcare homes.

The funding will support family childcare homes, sites that provide infant/toddler care, and/or sites that care for children whose families work nontraditional hours.

Selected organizations had to be existing providers of childcare-focused financial assistance or scholarship dollars.

Selected entities may aid families including essential family supplies, full spectrum doula care, lactation support, group or individual peer support and education, and resource navigation.

Funding will address conflict resolution, violence prevention, domestic violence intervention, health and wellness, and critical time interventions. Providers will contribute to community safety and combat crime through culturally affirming support systems.

Projects will be targeted toward populations disproportionately impacted by the pandemic.

Next Steps with ARPA Community Grant Award Process

- BOCC approves ARPA grant recommendations at the December 12th BOCC meeting.
- Upon approval, staff will communicate award levels to nonprofit entities and begin contract negotiations with nonprofit entities for services.
- Staff will recommend the Board's approval of contract(s) that assist with contract monitoring, additional infrastructure development and/or serve as a fiscal agent.





Next Steps with ARPA Planning

- BOCC vote on ARPA grant recommendations at the December 12, 2022 meeting.
- Staff will continue to vet potential jointly funded ILAs with the City of Durham. Additional recommendations will occur in January and February.
- Updates on county department facilitated community initiatives and RFPs will occur at the January 2023 work session.
- Finalize remaining RFP categories by March 2023.
