Policy 8.1.2c. Typical Roadway Cross Sections. For development in the City, the City Department of Transportation shall require right-ofway dedication in accordance with the typical roadway cross sections adopted by the City Council. In absence of a set of cross-sections adopted by the City Council, the City Department of Transportation and Public Works Department shall use the Complete Streets and Safety Guidelines in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) (as may be amended from time to time) and the NCDOT Complete Streets Planning and Design Guidelines. The City Departments of Public Works and Transportation shall require construction of residential streets in accordance with the "City of Durham Reference Guide For Development," (as may be amended from time to time)."
